"We stayed at the Hotel Berolina, just off Karl Marx Allee, in this rebuilt area," she wrote.

"The streets were almost too wide for the little traffic around. A couple of streets behind the hotel was a newly-developed flat area. Old flats were being demolished and a new block erected almost immediately on the site. Very unimaginative buildings they were. were.

"The hotel was very modern — about 12 storeys high. Our suite was on the 9th floor, included a television set and was quite luxurious. The food was good, too."

"We saw the Chang-ing of the Guards. "When we arrived back at the hotel, we had to wait an hour and a half for lunch. We were furious about this, because the delay cut down our time in West Berlin and there was so much we wanted to

"Finally, after 2.30 p.m., we set out for West Berlin. There was a long delay at "Check Point Charlie," while the guards checked passports and the collective visa. It the collective visa. It was quite an ordeal as the guard took the passport, looked at it, looked at you, looked looked at you, looked at the passport, then at you again, before he was satisfied. He was such a serious young guard. It was hard for us to be serious, but we were advised to sit still and be quiet.
