our land, Alterations and extensions have since been carried out under the supervision of our building adviser, Mr. Vic. Hayes, and it is hoped that the building will be ready for occupa-tion about July. Plans of our com-pleted hall have already been drawn up and submitted to the Brunswick City Council and as soon as the Building permit can be obtained it is hored to make a start on the main hall.
