Grandad, as he was most popularly known, had been an active member of the Group for the past twenty years. Firstly when it was known as 3rd Emendon, and later when it was changed to 4th Brunswick.

He became hon, secretary of the Group Committee since its inception.

He has taken a keen personal interest in the welfare of the boys since the formation of the Group. His personality and example have been an inspiration to all who have had contact with him, be they Cub, Scout or Rover, and his unflagging interest and work for the Group have been a continual source of inspiration to the Scouters and Group Committee members.

On the 22nd February, 1947, he was presented with the "Thanks Badge" by our District President, Cr. Norm Shells.

Mr. Bowden, since 1934, has loaned the Group—free of cost—the use of his property, sheds, electricity, etc.

Towards the end of last year, Grandad (who, incidentally, is well over 80 years of age) decided, owing to illhealth, to relinquish his conection with the Group and it was with deep regret we were obliged to accept his resignation.
